3 Pillars of BCM

CHAPLAINCY SERVICES

Chaplaincy Services provides spiritual care and consultation to individuals, groups, and institutions, regardless of their religious affiliation.

CONGREGATIONAL WELLNESS

Congregational Wellness trains church members to implement wellness ministries within congregations and communities they serve, promoting the health and well-being of its members.

GRANTS

BCM strives to provide a better quality of life for all people in the region through grantmaking with specific zones of interest in health, education, and public safety.

CHAPLAINCY SERVICES

A tragic diagnosis. An unexpected death. Everything can change in a second. In these moments in life, everyone needs someone to lift them up. This is where BCM's chaplains step in.

Serving in five hospitals, two nursing homes, and all eight New Orleans police districts, BCM's chaplains offer a "ministry of presence," a safety net of grace when life falls apart. Theologically educated and professionally boardcertified, each chaplain provides spiritual care and consultation to people in crisis regardless of religious affiliation.

Whether it's offering on-the-scene support for New Orleans police officers or providing comfort and aid to the sick and suffering, BCM's 13 chaplains bring dignified, loving, and respectful care to those who need it in the most trying times of their lives.

A Story of Chaplaincy

COMFORT IN THE MIDST OF PAIN

phone call from a patrol officer summoning me to Tulane Hospital to minister to a death. This call was different because the death was not of a police officer, but of a police officer's infant child from SIDS.

Entering the hospital,
I identified myself as a
police chaplain and was
ushered down the hall to
the parents and child. The
hallway seemed long. My
mind drifted back to another
long walk. This walk was
down a set of stairs, and at
the bottom laid the lifeless

body of my own child.

Immediately, I was certain
of one thing. I could relate
to this police officer motherto-mother and offer her the
spiritual and emotional care
she needed.

The officer was numb and in shock. There are times when just a physical presence of support speaks volumes, especially when words are not enough. I provided her a "ministry of presence." I moved in close to listen while giving her space to grieve. I chose to simply "be" with her. My time to "do" came in the weeks

and months after that day.
The death of this child
spanned the emotions of the
entire NOPD force. I was there
for the officer who lost her
child, her immediate family, and
her second family — the NOPD.

CONGREGATIONAL WELLNESS

uring both times of crisis and times of peace and prosperity, churches are where people go to find answers in their everyday lives. They provide people with more than just spiritual fulfillment. Today's churches cater to the whole person's health and wellbeing. By offering counseling, advice, and a sense of fellowship, every church's ultimate goal is to meet all the needs of its people. To help churches meet this goal BCM provides three health and wellness programs that foster the mind, body, and spirit connection.

Our Church Nurse Education
Program (CNEP) supports
this "whole-person" approach
to well-being. Through
training in areas of health,
spirituality, and community
wellness, we equip nurses to
start health ministries in their
church, assess congregants'
health concerns, and provide
real-life solutions to pressing
health issues.

We also train lay people without a nursing background through our Congregational Health Promoter Program (CHPP). Participants learn how to begin health ministries, arrange wellness activities, and organize

community action efforts addressing health concerns.

Hypertension and obesity are two of the most common issues affecting people in our community. Our Strategies to Trim and Reduce (STAR) Project is a 10-week weight loss and blood pressure control initiative. Participants learn about body systems, nutrition, exercise, and how prayer and daily reflection can help increase motivation.

BCM is proud to partner with churches in providing quality care and resources that allow our community's people to heal and thrive.









St. Joseph Catholic Church

STAR PROJECT

is all about ministering to people on their own terms. Traditionally, BCM's STAR Project has focused on addressing obesity, but in the Vietnamese community in New Orleans East, this is less of a concern. This is why St. Joseph Catholic Church adapted STAR to minister to their congregation's unique needs.

"It's a subtler problem for many of our members," says Lang Le. "Their BMI numbers may be in the normal range, but there are still areas where we can improve their health and well-being."

For St. Joseph congregants, teaching portion control and incorporating a balanced diet with proper exercise helped them improve and control other conditions, such as high blood pressure and diabetes. Learning about nutrition, increasing activity, drinking plenty of water, and sleeping properly has led to a more vibrant, active, and engaged congregation.

Upon successfully completing the STAR Project, St. Joseph received a grant from BCM to partner with other local organizations such as VIET (Vietnamese Initiatives in Economic Training) to arrange community wellness activities. VIET provides language translation programs to help Vietnamese-speaking congregants receive SNAP, Medicaid, and Medicare health insurance information.

PATHWAYS TO ECONOMIC SUCCESS FOR STUDENTS

In today's world, students need to gain relevant work experience prior to graduation to increase their chances of being hired for high-wage, in-demand careers. That is why BCM supports the New Orleans Career Center and their goal to give every New Orleans high school student the power to shape their own future, ensuring a better life for themselves and their families.

With BCM funding, New Orleans Career Center. Operation Spark, and New Orleans Video Access Center (NOVAC) have partnered together to provide highquality technical training coursework for high school students from 16 public high schools in the Greater New Orleans area. Students earn industry-based credentials and credits that are not only valued by regional employers in a wide range of highgrowth industries, but also count toward high school graduation.

By offering public high school students meaningful hands-on technical training that is beyond the scope of a traditional high school setting, participating students are receiving a competitive advantage over their peers and mastering workplace readiness skills much earlier. In supporting this project, BCM saw a tremendous opportunity to develop the next generation of New Orleans leaders and strengthen the overall economy of Greater New Orleans.


Suicide risk assessments, counseling services,

psychoeducation training on signs of suicide, how to get help, and coordination of psychiatric services in Plaquemines Parish were all made available with BCM's support.

Plaquemines' suicide rate, one of the highest in the state and well above the national average, has seen a drastic reduction since the C.A.R.E. Centers made it a focal point of their efforts. With additional support provided by BCM, more licensed, professional

counselors are actively working in schools, counseling children and letting them know how much they matter.

ovenant House doesn't iust save children, they invest in their futures. From the minute a youth walks through the doors of Covenant House on North Rampart Street to the moment they leave, they are provided support and encouragement with the goal of getting them off the street and on a path to a better tomorrow.

With BCM funding, the Rights of Passage Program (ROP) has made tremendous strides towards that goal.

The program functions as a "university for street kids," providing six to nine months of on-campus, dormitorystyle housing for homeless teens and one year of offsite apartment living while youth work, continue their education, improve their mental and behavioral health, build savings, and learn valuable life skills.

Through BCM's support, Covenant House has been able to continue the lifechanging work that has impacted the lives of

hundreds of vulnerable. homeless children, teens, and young adults. Offering young people protection from the streets and their pasts, Covenant House is assisting them in making the best decisions for their future.

OPEN TABLE

James Samaritan provides physical and relational resources to foster families in an effort to secure the placement of children in loving homes.

One unique challenge for James Samaritan is providing guidance and counseling for young adults who "age-out" of the foster care program without ever finding a "forever family." For these young adults, BCM stepped in to fund a mentoring program called Open Table. Open Table creates support groups of

individuals who mentor and counsel these young adults as they transition into the adult world, offering advice and support during an emotionally demanding time, and making sure that each youth has stable people they can rely upon.

BCM's support has enabled James Samaritan to provide the type of intense, focused encouragement these young adults need, ensuring they don't fall through the cracks of the foster care system. By providing young adults with the tools to become

self-sufficient, James
Samaritan is keeping
them out of the criminal
court system and helping
them find a path to a
successful life.

With BCM's help, James Samaritan is pioneering the Open Table concept within Louisiana, which is all about building strong, intentional communities around the teens who are 'aging-out' of the foster care program. It's truly a game-changer in the lives of these young people and the community as a whole.




